## **Field Maintenance Update**

CSF field maintenance has continued right on schedule for this year. Overall the field has been in very good conditionfor our members with the only detraction from flying being the extremely wet weather we experienced earlier in the season. One project that was been undertaken was extending the drainage line that runs under the runway all the way to end of the property. This drainage line now runs excess storm water completely off the property into a natural drainage area in the woods. This project addressed a long term problem that was causing soil erosion and safety concerns due to the washout areas on the east side of the field. Thanks very much to Prez Steve for his efforts in digging most of the new trench and also for buying and transporting over 100 ' of corrugated pipe that is now connected to the existing drain line and buried. We still have a little more clean up work to do on this project but the main problem has been resolved which is controlling and directing the storm water off the site.

We're into the shank of our flying season (as a golfer, I use that term cautiously). After a wet Spring with less opportunity to fly we are now more than ready to get into the air.

I want to stress a couple of very important safety rules that sometimes get "bent" when we are rushing to get airborne. First: Don't connect your flight battery in the pits. By the pits, I mean the shelter area with the charging stations under roof. Please either connect your flight batteries on the flight stands or 'do it' in the grass. It only takes one runaway plane, helicopter or multirotor in the pits to cause mayhem for many.

Second: The AMA flying site guidelines recommend that pilots maintain at least a 25 foot distance from the runway edge. This is particularly important when there is more than one pilot flying at a time.

Field Maintenance Update (Cont.) Our efforts to reduce the amount of time our members are asked to spend maintaining the field is a planned effort. I feel that it has also been largely successful. To achieve this, we are still performing our routine spraying around the runway and borders of the property to reduce the amount of hand trimming that is needed. Also, we have been working on removing the overgrowth along the driveway as weather permits by both pruning and spraying.

We have had support in this area from Craig "Ace" Eisentrout, Ken Russel and Steve Harness and of course from our good neighbor Denny who keeps our lawn mowed and looking great for us.

Other members have also helped by assuring that any loose trash is picked up and cleaning up in areas by keeping limbs collected and off the mowing area and general clean up (Thanks Angie and Ben). These efforts are noticed and really appreciated.

I hope you enjoy the rest of your summer.

This year we added a new "airport" quality windsock to the field. It was set at a height that captures the wind velocity below the tree line at takeoff and final landing heights just above the runway. As many of you know, wind velocity changes can be significant above the tree line. Let us know, does this windsock meet your needs or do you prefer to know the wind velocity at a higher elevation than this?

Club Safety Update (Cont) There are at least 6 concrete pads situated at the correct distance back from the runway. Use these. If you are there by yourself, it's still a good idea to use that distance to get used to the perspective you'll have when flying with other pilots.

While we want everybody to have fun at our site, the first priority is always the safety of everybody at the field. Both pilots and spectators.

This photo shows the flight stands at CSF sitting on the concrete pads that are approximately 25' from the runway. For safety, spectators should never be allowed in front of the flight stands at any time. This is unsafe and can easily interfere with a pilot's concentration and line of sight. Pilots should also stand at a distance from the runway that is approximately the same distance as the front of the concrete pads.
